Chair Knoff called the meeting to order and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

*APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Chair Knoff called for a motion on the August and November 2014 meetings Minutes. Bill Decker made the motion to approve the August and November 2014 Minutes, seconded by Terry Carr. The motion carried unanimously.

CURRENT BUSINESS

<u>Hazardous Material Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Grant:</u> Mr. Anderson stated that staff received the HMEP grant. However, the timing has changed. It is now in the federal fiscal year; therefore, the requirements to conduct an exercise is by September 30th. He stated that staff is coordinating with CSX, St. Johns and Clay Counties' Fire and Rescue Departments on the multi-jurisdictional exercise. Further updates will be provided at the next meeting.

<u>Annual Training Numbers:</u> Chief Knoff stated that 364 students participated in 3,680 hours of training conducted by District 4 LEPC. Mr. Anderson provided a breakdown of the individuals trained by level and profession through the eight training opportunities.

Annual Hazardous Materials Symposium Update: Chief Knoff reported that the symposium went very well this year with over 200 attendees. Six to eight teams participated in the HazMat team competition; with Clay County placing second overall and a team member winning best overall risk assessment. He stated that the classes were very informative and believes the overall and continued success of the program is doing well. Chief Knoff stated that there are plans to hold another HazMat Symposium next year at the same venue, Fire Rescue East, along with the team competition. It is hoped to have more teams from around the Region and the State to participate.

It was recommended that Clay County Fire and Rescue be presented with a certificate of accomplishment for their success in the team competition. Chief Knoff stated that staff can draft something for presentation.

<u>Training Grant & New Training Opportunities:</u> Mr. Anderson provided an overview of training conducted since November 2014 highlighting the HazMat IC-Street Level Command and Control, the 3rd annual HazMat Symposium and the CSX Operation Respond training classes. He stated that the CSX classes were taught by the private industry; therefore, no LEPC funding was utilized for the training except for coordination purposes. A total of 181 people participated in LEPC sponsored training, which is better than the previous year mainly due to the private partnerships. The LEPC will seek to do more private industry training partnerships in the future due to their expertise and available resources.

Discussion followed on ways to achieve assistance with training and resources through the private industry. It was mentioned that FEC and CSX rail companies could be good sources for training and props for the LEPC training. Mr. Anderson stated that some of the other LEPCs do have resources that could be borrowed and utilized if needed as well.

Mr. Anderson stated that, in working with CSX, this fall they will be trying to bring the CSX Safety Train into our Region, which could allow for training on all types of containers that they have on the rail line. It is different than the TRANSCAER initiative that they had.

<u>Upcoming Opportunities:</u> Mr. Anderson stated that an advertisement was sent out regarding Norfolk Southern's rail safety training on chlorine ethanol later this week in Jacksonville. Additionally, potential future courses were identified based on need from last year. These will be worked on through this current funding cycle in preparation for the next funding cycle.

<u>Hazards Analysis</u> (Section 302 Facilities) <u>Update:</u> Mr. Anderson has provided information on the list of facilities requiring visitations for each county. These visits have begun with Baker and Nassau Counties having been completed. The remaining counties will be coordinated with in the coming days; Duval and Flagler County takes care of their own. The State deliverable for the first half is February 1st; these have been

submitted to the State for their review. All the facilities are required to report their chemical inventory reports by March 1st. This aligns with the annual reporting for March 1st and happens to be our 'How to Comply' training, which goes over the rules, regulations, why we are the way we are and how facilities navigate the electronic reporting system of E-Plan.

<u>Training Task Force and LEPC Chair/Staff Meetings:</u> Chair Knoff stated that the Florida Division of Emergency Management (FDEM) issued a contract to a vendor to develop the HazMat Technician Taskbook and learning objective requirements in compliance with NFPA 472, which is moving forward with anticipated completion by early summer. FDEM was also tasked with doing the same thing for the operations level.

SERC Meeting: Mr. Anderson reported that there have been several presentations on the refinement of a GIS tool that every county can use for the hazards analysis. He provided some background on the State's 'Gator' tool, which is utilized by many Emergency Managers. One of the layers being added to the Gator is all the facilities information. A beta test has been conducted, where a Regions' hazards analysis were uploaded and added to Gator so when you go to a Gator map, all the Region's facilities populate. When a facility is selected, all the documents that have been pdf'd for that facility will be displayed. Following more beta testing, it is hoped that within the next two years it will be standardized for all counties to be able to do their hazards analysis using Gator. Additionally, there have been discussions regarding FDEM contracting out to the LEPCs to perform the review of hazards analysis within their own region in the future. This would allow a more tangible feel of the site visits being conducted in our region. It is hoped that the contract will be executed by next year.

REPORTS

Treasurer's Report: Chair Knoff reported there is currently \$162.55 in the LEPC account.

<u>Hazardous Materials Release Report</u> – Mr. Anderson provided an overview of the hazardous materials incident reports statewide, highlighting those in Region 4. This information was provided in the agenda packet.

OTHER

Thomas Yatabe Award Winner: Chief Joel Sneed was awarded the Thomas Yatabe Award.

Clay/St. Johns HazMat Training Exercise: Captain Brian Mitzel provided an overview of the Clay/St. Johns County HazMat Training exercise. Agencies participating in the drill were St. Johns County Fire Rescue, Clay County Fire Rescue, St. Augustine Fire Department, St. Johns County Sheriff's Office, St. Augustine Police Department, St. Augustine Beach Police Department, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Florida East Coast Railway, and the 44th CST out of Camp Blanding. The drill was a simulated EHS chemical leak due to malicious activity. Although there were challenges such as communication and site logistics, the training was an overall success. A brief discussion followed.

<u>Duval County Plating Facility HazMat Release:</u> Mr. Terry Carr provided an overview of a situation that occurred at a plating facility in the City of Jacksonville. He presented the dangers that existed and the problems encountered in addressing and remedying the situation. Highlighted were the various avenues that are open to both businesses and first responders in identifying potential hazardous material release and resources in its prevention and/or containment. If you're not sure a site contains hazardous materials, contact the local agencies first, then the State Watch Office, then the National Response Center, and finally to the federal level. A brief discussion followed.

<u>Changes to LEPC Structure and Organization:</u> Mr. Anderson provided an overview of recommended changes to the LEPC structure and organization. It was determined that the core functions the LEPC should be responsible for are Training, Hazard Analysis and Public Outreach & Education. These areas will now be the main Sub-Committees of the LEPCs. The LEPC meetings will now include the dissemination of information from the State and then break out into the three subcommittees. The LEPCs have been asked to participate in the Statewide Training Exercise Planning Process this year. Information will sent to each of the Counties regarding developing their GAP analysis. This information will be used to prepare a three-year training schedule.

The Training Sub-Committee will be chaired by Chief Silcox. This Sub-Committee will be tasked with developing a three year training calendar and the costs/budget associated with that, coordinate with private partners for additional training opportunities, and develop a database of local qualified instructors. The goal is to have this work completed by the February meetings annually.

The Hazard Analysis Sub-Committee will be chaired by Bill Decker. This Sub-Committee will be tasked with reviewing and approving Hazard Analysis information for 152 sites. This group would need to meet in February to review/approve the first half of the analyses and again in April to review/approve the second half.

The Public Outreach and Education Sub-Committee will be chaired by Terry Carr. This Sub-Committee will be tasked with designating the HazMat Awareness week, conduct one public outreach event annually, identify a public information officer for the LEPC, and identify supplemental environmental projects that can be submitted to the State.

Mr. Carry suggested that an asset would be to have an interested citizen on the Sub-Committees in addition to the media representation.

Chief Knoff stated that SERC is looking at developing a supplemental environmental project template for use statewide by each agency that submits a supplemental environmental project. This would allow the point of contact information to remain current.

Chief Knoff stated that if anyone interested in serving on any of these Sub-Committees to let Mr. Anderson know. This information will be passed on to the Chairs.

Dear Administrator Fugate:

The North Central Florida Local Emergency Planning Committee has been actively following and participating in the Federal efforts to improve safety and security at chemical facilities following the issuing of Executive Order 13650 and the explosion in West, Texas.

The LEPC would like to recommend to FEMA that this would be a good time to give greater visibility and priority to hazardous materials preparedness on the ready.gov website.

We believe that hazardous materials preparedness should have equal footing with the currently featured six primary hazards: earthquakes, floods, hurricanes, tornadoes, wildfires, and winter storms.

As you may recall, Hazardous Materials Awareness Week has been a focus of Florida LEPC outreach activities for a number of years. This year, we have decided to move it to the month of September to participate in National Preparedness Month. Our theme for 2015 is public education and outreach on sheltering in-place versus evacuation during a chemical release.

The ready.gov website provides a good start on hazardous materials preparedness, but could be more useful as an educational tool if updated and more visible. For example, the graphic for hazardous materials incidents shows a bio-hazard symbol and a "read more about sheltering in place" link takes you to evacuation guidelines.

RE: Hazardous Materials Incident Reports

SUMMARY

The attached tables and graphs provide information on all hazardous materials incident reports received by the State Watch Office. The incident reports are reviewed by Hazardous Materials Planning staff on a daily basis for compliance and verification purposes. The information helps identify potential Section 304 violators, as well as facilities which may have an obligation to report under other sections of EPCRA and the Risk Management Planning (RMP) programs.

- **Table 1** lists incidents by LEPC District for the period of **December 1, 2014** through **February 28, 2015**. "Potential Section 304 Investigations" are incidents involving the release of Extremely Hazardous Substances (EHS) or Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) chemicals at fixed facilities and are investigated by State-level staff. In order for an incident to be covered under Section 304, the EHS or CERCLA chemical must meet or exceed its designated Reportable Quantity (RQ) and have potential for offsite exposure.
- **Table 2** provides a breakdown for fixed facilities of all hazardous material incidents where evacuations, injuries or deaths were reported (where available).
- **Table 3** covers transportation related incidents and differentiates between chemical-related and traffic accident-related deaths. Please note that official causes of death are determined by the medical examiner's office and may take up to 90 days for the final report.
- *Graph I* depicts total incidents within the State from <u>January 1, 2001</u> through <u>December 31, 2014</u>.
- *Graph II* depicts total incidents within each LEPC District from March 1, 2014 through February 28, 2015.




Graph I HAZARDOUS MATERIALS INCIDENT REPORTS

RE: Kids in Schools Zones

LEPC staff will provide an overview of a recent report called Kids in Danger Zones.

Kids in Danger Zones examines the number of children who attend a school located within the self-reported vulnerability zone of over 3,400 high-risk chemical facilities in the U.S. These facilities produce, use, or store dangerous chemicals and so must report them to the federal Risk Management Program of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The facilities that are the focus of this study represent about a quarter of all the facilities reporting to the Risk Management Program. The locations of 122,968 public and private schools, educating 53.6 million students, were mapped against the vulnerability zones of these chemical facilities.

The presentation will highlight facilities, students, and schools within the northeast Florida region.

Florida

51 Percent of Students at Risk of Chemical Catastrophes

In Florida, 1,495,051 students attend school within the vulnerability zone of a high-risk chemical facility. That means that 1 in 2 students from preschool to high school face chemical leaks, gas clouds, or explosions.

The April 2013 fertilizer plant explosion in West, Texas demonstrated the unseen dangers of chemical facilities. That explosion killed 15 people, injured hundreds of others, and destroyed three schools. If the explosion had occurred during the day, many schoolchildren might have been harmed as well.

But many students and schools could be better protected from danger. Safer chemicals and technologies exist that would reduce or eliminate these vulnerability zones and leave significantly fewer children at risk, and some facilities have already made the switch. However, since these changes are

not required, many other facilities continue to use dangerous chemicals and leave schools, children, and neighbors at risk. The Obama administration could require facilities to switch to safer technologies and reduce the risk to Florida's students.

Florida's kids should not have to go to school each day with the looming threat of a chemical disaster when safer technologies exist.

Top Five Counties Where Students Are Most at Risk

Every state has locations where chemical facilities place more students at risk. The first table lists the counties in Florida that have the highest percentage of students attending schools in vulnerability zones. Students in Putnam County are more likely to attend school in a vulnerability zone than anywhere else in the state as its facilities put 11,362 students at risk – 97% of all school-aged children in the county.

The known vulnerability zones in Florida put a total of 2,908 schools at risk, some of which are in more than one vulnerability zone. The second table lists the Florida schools that are currently located in the most known vulnerability zones in the state. Overlapping vulnerability zones, which increase the risk to the schools and communities covered, often occur around larger cities and heavily industrialized areas. In Florida, the schools bearing the greatest risk from such overlapping vulnerability zones include Bing Elementary School in Tampa, Palm River Elementary School in Tampa, and Shore Elementary Magnet School in Tampa.

The facilities listed in the third table place the most students in Florida at risk of a chemical disaster. Allied Universal Corporation in Miami, which stores 4,000,000 pounds of chlorine, has 332,125 students studying in its vulnerability zone, thereby putting more students at risk than any other facility in Florida. Sentry Industries, Inc. in Miami is in second place, with 324,734 students in its vulnerability zone. Any efforts in Florida to better protect schools from chemical risks should include changes to reduce the vulnerability zones of these top facilities.



What Can You Do?

First, take action (http://bit.ly/kids-in-danger-zones-action) and urge the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to protect our children by requiring facilities to adopt safer chemical alternatives. Act now and urge others to stand up for children in Florida.

Second, use our <u>interactive map</u> (http://tesla.foreffectivegov.org/KidsAndToxins/bin-release) to learn more about the dangerous facilities in your area and the schools they place in harm's way.

Third, contact facilities in your area and your local officials. Demand that they establish a plan to shift to safer technologies or store smaller quantities of hazardous chemicals to reduce the vulnerability zones that place children, schools, and communities at risk.
